FIRST ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Consider and take necessary action to approve the minutes of the June 20, 2022, Meeting.

SECOND ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Consider and take necessary action on procedures, processes, timelines, and priorities regarding lifting restrictions and regulations implemented during the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency – Resolution No. 2022-27

Emergency Management Coordinator, Cole Kirkland, asked Council to consider extending the local order and will also provide an update regarding our local COVID numbers. Staff is recommending that we extend our local order, keeping us in line with Governor Abbott and the continued state-wide COVID order. With information received and coordinating with the state and regional officials, the rise of covid cases has pushed back the plans to demobilize assets. The medical warehouses have been restocked and are now on standby for requests.

At this time, it is the recommendation of staff to extend the local order which allows resources to be routed and moved fluidly from local, regional, and state levels. Locally, our supplies and facilities are adequate as our numbers rise. We are not at the point where our local resources are overwhelmed but we have supplies and protocols in place to quickly mobilize other resources if there is a dynamic increase in hospitalizations.

Mayor Pinner signed a Mayoral Order extending the order from July 7 to this current Council meeting date (July 11th)

THIRD ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Consider and take necessary action on the quarterly investment report for the quarter ending on June 30, 2022

For your review and acceptance is the regular investment report for the quarter ended June 30, 2022. In accordance with the guidelines and strategies set forth in the City's Investment Policy, the Public Funds Investment Act and the Public Funds Collateral Act, only funds that are not needed for immediate use are invested.

The three primary objectives of the City's Investment Policy are listed below, in order of importance:

1. Safety
2. Liquidity
3. Yield

The City's investments in the accompanying report meet the above objectives within state standards. Longer term investments are in certificates of deposit and are secured by bank-owned securities pledged by the bank to the City for the amounts in excess of FDIC coverage. These pledged securities are held by the bank's safekeeping agent. The City's investments in certificates of deposit are with local banks other than the City's depository bank, which assists the City in diversifying its cash position.

Interest rates, while still low for both short-term pooled investments and certificates of deposit, have started to trend upward. The City was earning .64% on depository demand monies at the end of the quarter; Texas Class (non-government pool) started to outpace the City Bank rate and monies were moved to the pool at the beginning of the quarter. Interest earned this quarter was \$26,415.68, which is an increase of \$15,499.30 from the previous quarter. We continue to evaluate investment options in light of market fluctuations.

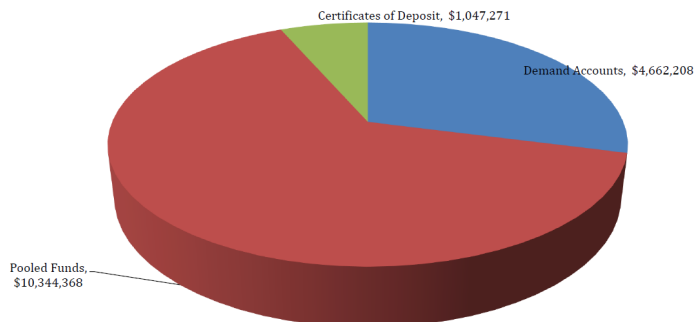

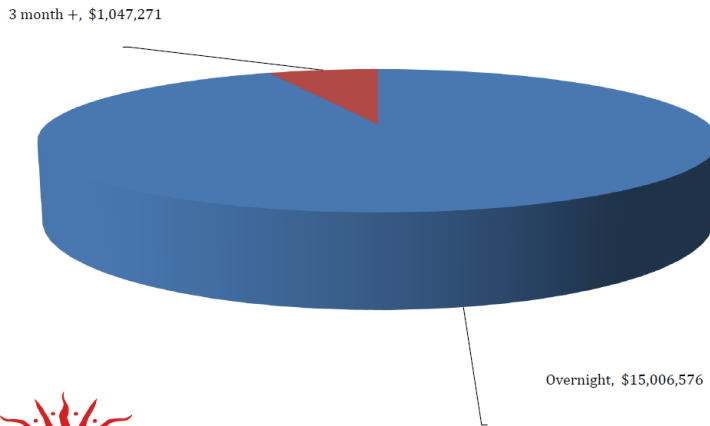

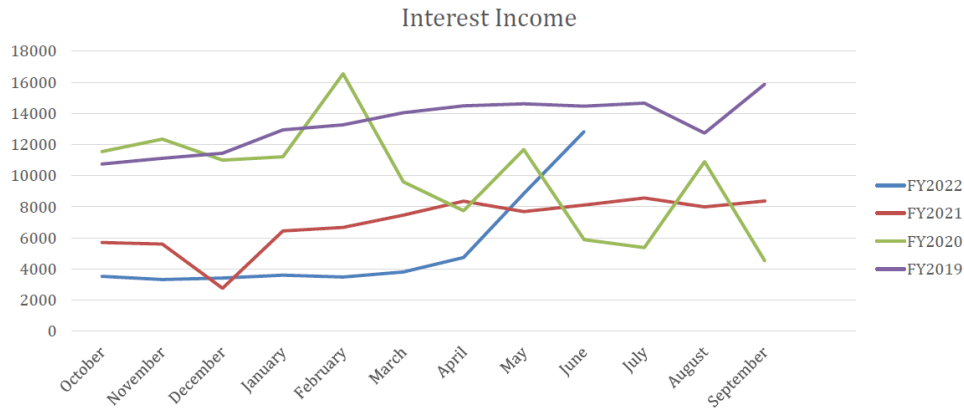
Portfolio Composition

FOURTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Consider and take necessary action to appoint board members to the Main Street Advisory Board

The Main Street Advisory Board has two people that were unable to complete their terms. The Main Street Advisory Board met, and their recommendation is as follows:

Appoint Christine Mitchell and RoxAnn Gonzales to serve the remainder of these vacant positions.

Main Street Program Director, Tania Moody, advertised these positions with local radio, newspaper and social media. In addition, Main Street board members sought out citizens to bring forward by nomination.

FIFTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Discussion regarding City of Levelland board appointment process.

City Council was provided lists of all appointed City of Levelland Boards showing all members up for possible re-appointment. We have attempted to contact all board members who are up for re-appointment and have asked if they would like to continue to serve and their wishes are noted on the sheet as well. We do have some resignations and open positions due to lack of attendance that need to be filled. We are presenting for your information and will also be advertising through social media the opportunity to serve and will be accepting applications for service to boards for the next month and these names will be shared with you all and at a later date in August we will need to formally appoint members to make our boards full for the next year of service.

No Action Taken.

SIXTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Announcement of the new City of Levelland Fire Chief.

After properly advertising for the position, scouring over applications and selecting a slate of candidates, the Human Resources Director and the City Manager held interviews over the

phone on Tuesday, June 21st. City Manager contacted references after the interview process and made his selection. Candidate has signed his offer sheet and will become official today.

Appointment by City Manager: Jay McKay has been named Fire Chief for the City of Levelland.

No Action Taken.

SEVENTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Discussion about the Budget Workshop schedule

City Manager, Brandon Anderson, discussed possible dates for the upcoming budget work sessions. Also provided: TML Informational Sheet of budget and tax deadlines for cities with a population under 30,000 as well as an initial working copy and proposed first draft of the budget.

No Action Taken.

EIGHTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Receive, consider & take necessary action on recommendations of the Animal Service Task Force regarding regulations, policies, fees and rules regarding animal control within the municipality.

In order to continue to provide services with the City of Levelland, an interlocal agreement has to be reviewed and approved by both the City of Levelland and StarCare yearly.

For the past several years the Levelland Police Department and the Hockley County Sheriff's Department have been working diligently to ensure mental health services are provided to the citizens of Levelland and Hockley County. Recently, both agencies have developed a Crisis Intervention Team Officer position to work hand and hand with our mental health provider (StarCare Special Health System). For the CIT program to be effective, it is imperative we continue to have a positive working relationship between both MHMR provider and our City.

Seconded by Mary Engledow

To approve an interlocal agreement with Lubbock Regional MHMR Center dba StarCare Specialty Health System for qualified mental health professional services mental to assist the Levelland Police Department.

Motion carried unanimously.

Earlier this year the City Council established and appointed the Animal Services Task Force to assist the City with evaluating the policies and procedures of animal control and the animal shelter.

Seven citizens were names to the Task Force. This Task Force met 4 time and discussed man issues facing the Levelland Animal Shelter.

The following recommendations were made by the Task Force:

Possible City Ordinance Changes

- a. Sec 2.108 Animals must have rabies tag or other traceable identification (instead of City license)
- b. Require proof of rabies vaccination upon redemption
- c. All animals that leave the shelter will be chipped at the owner's expense ONLY IF THEY ARE BEING ADOPTED/FOSTERED/RESCUED. This does not apply to animals that are being picked up by their rightful owner.
- d. CHANGE: Sec 2.107 There is a state law requiring a rabies vaccination. City should "Strongly encourage" distemper & parvo vaccine. (It is currently required in our ordinance)
- e. Adoption "Re-Homing" Fees:
 - i. The Task Force voted (6-1 vote) to recommend to City Council the following fees to be incorporated into the City of Levelland Animal Control Ordinance:
 1. \$100 Re-Homing Fee, to be forwarded as payment to the vet who performs the required spay/neuter. Vet will invoice the City. Should the spay/neuter cost be LESS THAN the \$100, fine print should reflect the remainder of that money needs to be considered a donation to the Shelter.
 2. \$10 Chipping Fee
 3. For animals that are already altered and chipped: \$25 Re-Homing fee
 4. For animals that are already altered, but need a chip: \$35 Re-Homing fee
- f. Dog Redemption Fees: (this is specifically for animals who have been picked up by Animal Control, and are being redeemed by their owners)
 - i. Current Ordinance: The redemption fee for all impounded dogs shall be \$10.00 plus \$5.00 per day that the dog was impounded. CHANGE THIS to Initial fee of \$25, plus a \$5/day charge. (6-1 vote)
 - ii. Keep this the same The redemption fee for all impounded dogs that have been impounded once previously shall be \$20.00 plus \$10.00 per day that the dog was impounded.

- iii. Keep this the same The redemption fee for all impounded dogs that have been impounded more than twice previously shall be \$30.00 plus \$15.00 per day that the dog was impounded.

2. Brand New Ordinance Recommendations

- a. Limit number of animals able to be kept at a residence at 4 dogs and 4 cats TOTAL...with allowance for one litter of each. Several communities have similar ordinances, Including Plainview, Lubbock, Muleshoe and Hale Center.
- b. Institute a Multi-pet permit for residents who wish to have more than the allowable number of animals. This is an application process, and would require the resident to meet certain criteria in order to have the application accepted. Lubbock has a similar permit, which stays in effect for 2 years.
- c. Institute a Breeders Permit. This is specifically for residents who intend to have more than the allowable number litters. It is an application process. They recommended the annual fee be \$250.
- d. When residents surrender litters, the Task Force wants a fee associated with that. They want the fee to go up with subsequent litters. (fee amount was not discussed)
- e. Animal Shelter Advisory Board, as set forth in Resolution 2014-26. The Task Force wants to increase the size of the Advisory Board to include:
 - i. One licensed Veterinarian
 - ii. The City Manager or his representative
 - iii. One Animal Control Officer appointed by the Chief of Police
 - iv. One member from the Levelland Animal Friends or other animal welfare organization
 - v. Two city residents
 - vi. One member from Levelland City Council

3. POLICY REVIEW:

- a. The Committee recommends changing verbiage from “owner surrender” to “Stray Surrender” for those who are bringing stray dogs to the shelter to be placed for possible adoption. Also, they recommended continuing with the \$25 surrender fee for county residents. In regards to fees: The Task Force feels the ordinance should have a clause that gives enough latitude to make fees waivable for County residents if they are trying to help strays get adopted, as opposed to surrendering their own pets.

To authorize the City Manager to work with the City Attorney to make changes and proposed updates to the current ordinance to be presented to City Council for final approval.

NINTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Convene into executive session in accordance with Tex. Gov't Code §551.071 to seek the advice about pending or contemplated litigation, settlement offers or on matters in which duty of the attorney under the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct of the State Bar of Texas conflicts with Tex. Gov't Code Ch. 551, (Texas Local Government Code and Texas Government Code purchasing statutes and regulations – Levelland Industrial Rail Park)

Mayor Pinner declared Council to be in Executive Session at 6:46pm. She returned Council to regular session at 7:03pm.

TENTH ITEM OF BUSINESS:

Consider and take necessary action to award bid for EDA grant infrastructure improvements in the Levelland Industrial Rail Park

In 2020, the City of Levelland and LEDC was awarded a grant through the Economic Development Administration (EDA) to further expand water, sewer, and street infrastructure on the north side of the Levelland Industrial Rail Park. The grant that was applied for by the City and LEDC was in the amount of \$1.5 million. The TCF grant in the amount of \$625,000 for the rail infrastructure will be used to help offset the cash match requirement for the EDA grant which is being funded by the LEDC for the EDA grant.

Now that we are utilizing the EDA grant funds. In our phase one Rink's Lease Service, Inc. was selected as the contractor to do the water and sewer portion of the project. Phase two would include the roadway infrastructure improvements. Our Phase two roadway infrastructure portion of the project went out to bid and we received two bids. Per Parkhill's recommendation we did not select the lowest bidder. We selected the next the next lowest RESPONSIBLE bidder West Texas Paving, Inc. they are out of Wolfforth, Texas.

The scope for the EDA grant is as follows:

- Progressive Place Road with bid alternates
- Completion of a water line loop
- Completion of a sewer line
- Compliance with the EDA and TCF grant requirements

Following this memo is a copy of the recommendation letter from Parkhill and a copy of the bid tab.

We have reviewed the bids for the above referenced project received on June 28, 2022 and have worked to determine if all bids were submitted in accordance with guidelines established in the Bid Documents. A completed and accurate bid tabulation form is enclosed for your reference.

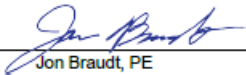
Following this analysis, and in accordance with the bidding documents, Section 00 21 13 Article 19, we then sought references of both L.A. Fuller & Sons, LTD and West Texas Paving, Inc. We received multiple references of poor performance for L.A. Fuller & Sons, LTD for similarly scoped projects. Given this, we would suggest that the City utilize the options provided to you, as noted above, and reject the bid provided by L.A. Fuller & Sons, LTD and award to the next lowest responsible bidder.

We recommend the Construction Contract for the Progressive Place Roadway Improvements project be awarded to West Texas Paving for the Total Contract Amount of \$1,342,548.00.
